Report for July from the Board of Directors

From Senior Director Roger Wieland

- ✎ John Kime, Chairman of the By-Laws Committee, presented the recommendation of the Committee concerning a change to the Continuing Membership section of the by-laws. John read the proposal at the Regular meeting for information only.
- ✎ The Commodore expressed concern about people driving too fast on MYC property and parking in the fire lanes. He will address these issues in his August message in *Ship to Shore*. Additionally he asked Director Tony Schweiker to follow-up in acquiring additional safety signs.
- ✎ The Commodore reviewed the MYC Guidelines and a recommendation was made by Director Tonneson to delete the requirement of turning boats to face north after Labor Day. The Board approved this change.
- ✎ Director Tonneson reported that we received an estimate of \$3,200.00 from Erich Company to treat our entire property for weeds. The Board approved an additional \$800.00 to the Grounds budget and to hire Erich.
- ✎ Director Martin stated that Sound Marine is scheduled to start the bulkhead work the week of July 20.
- ✎ The Board approved sending out all of the Associate Member invitations with the exception of one. They will make a final decision on that member next month.




Cruising Fleet News

From Chairman Dick Myers: Here we are in the last warm month of the year. I've heard lots of complaints about how warm it's been, but then again last year it was cold and rainy. Personally, I think it's been a great boating summer, lots of trips to Croton, cruising up the river, and late night swimming. I'll take dry and hot over cold and rainy any day.

The combination Dancing Under the Stars and Dock-Go-Round went very well. Sorry about the lack of a dinner; but with Ed Occhino being under the weather, we had no one qualified to cook for us. Hopefully, next year we can get back to normal. We'll have to talk to the new Cruising Fleet director about that.

Our next function will be the **Dinghy Safari** on August 14. Look for flyers at the head of the docks, and we'll meet at the Clubhouse at 11 A.M.

Ask Captain Dick: I was surprised by the amount of people who asked me, "Ok, what is a baggy wrinkle?" A baggy wrinkle is anything that prevents or lessens chafing on sails or lines. Those little things on the end of sailboat spreaders are technically baggy wrinkles. Coverings on dock lines where they rub on the boat or cleats are baggy wrinkles. Now you ask, "How did the name baggy wrinkle come about?" Believe it or not, the name comes from a small furry mammal native to the Great Lakes called bagus wrinklins americanus or more commonly known as the lesser baggy. It is the fresh water cousin to the baggus maximus, a sea-going creature that would climb up the rigging on sailing vessels at night to catch flying insects. During the day they would sleep peacefully in the rigging and seem to enjoy the occasional slap from the sails. Sailors soon noticed that when baggus maximus was in the rigging their sails required much less maintenance. The sailors soon learned to encourage the animals to stay on board, and a well kept ship would have entire colonies on board. Females tended to stay on the port

side, males would tend to stay starboard except during mating season. Then they would climb over to the port side to mate. This gave rise to the term "up and over."
