Yard Reminders

From Chairman Andy Hudson: By the time you read this, the fall haul schedule will have been posted. If you aren't on it, but want to be, e-mail Andy Hudson at: [see hard copy]. Remember to find and check your stands, and have chain for the sail-boat stands. Realize that if you come out late, you may need to launch at the end of April because you could be blocking other boats from their launch. Please don't come out late and plan repairs which could delay your launch.

Also, if you are shrink wrapping your boat, you are responsible for removing the shrink wrap from the Club property.

Ask Capt. Dick

From Dick Myers: Wow, talk about confusing. Try reading the nautical rules of the road regarding sound signals. Here you are running along nice and comfortable when the boat behind you sounds one blast of his horn. You're supposed to know that he intends to overtake you on your starboard side. Now you are meeting head on. One blast means he intends to pass you on your port side. Okay, now, you're crossing, and he blows one blast. At this point, you panic, stop the boat and try to figure out what he means.

The simplest way to understand what the horn sounds mean is to remember one blast means I'm altering course to starboard, two blasts means I'm altering course to port. This works in all situations. If you know what way he/she is turning, you can figure out on which side he/she wants to pass you. In inland waters, you should repeat the sound signal if you agree or blow five short blasts (danger) if you disagree.

Cruising Destination of the Month Watch Hill, Rhode Island

There are so many great harbors to visit, and one of my favorites is Watch Hill, Rhode Island. There is a beautiful beach/sand bar anchorage with space for many boats near the very crowded mooring field in the cove where you will find the town dinghy dock. We were able to dinghy ashore to browse many cute shops, galleries and restaurants. The historic "Ocean House" is at the top of the hill with a spectacular view of Block Island Sound. The resort is 136 years old, and was recently re-opened after extensive restoration to its original Victorian splendor. It would be a treat to stay and enjoy the luxury accommodations, gourmet restaurants, private grounds and beach. Captain Dick prefers to drop a hook as far down as possible behind Napatree Beach to go clamming, swimming and watching the sunsets.

The approach is narrow, but clearly marked. Find Fisher's Island Sound and Stonington breakwater and the Red/Green buoy "SP" at the beginning of the channel. It hugs the tip of "Sandy Point" with a surprisingly deep passage close to the shore. Continue through the long well-marked channel past sand bar until the last Red nun 22. You can then turn southwest into 9 or 10 feet of water with good holding, drop anchor and relax.
