Cruising Destination of the month: Bohemia Bay

located just south of the west end of the Chesapeake and Delaware Canal. Yesterday we stopped here to take on fuel (choke), add water and pump out at the Bohemia Bay Yacht Harbor. This is a large marina with a lot of slips under shed roofs. In the summer this is very desirable as it protects the boat from the hot sun and saves on the AC bill. In the winter many boats stay in the water, and the shed roof protects against snow and ice. Great friendly place with good staff and facilities.

We then went across the bay to Veasey Cove and anchored in the lee of the shore, protected from the south wind. The balmy breeze is a hint of what is coming our way as we travel south. The shore is lined with trees and some open manicured hillsides that lead up to estates. This is Maryland horse country. An excellent place to unwind after three long days getting down the Hudson from MYC, around the Jersey shore and up Delaware Bay.

Ask Cptn. Dick

From Dick Myers: I asked St. John Forbes, "What is the big deal on a spinnaker?" As far as I can see, a spinnaker might add a few knots to the speed of the boat, but it takes at least ten people to put one up and take it down, and that is excluding the captain. He will helm the boat and holler instructions and a few other words if someone does something wrong. "Not true," says St. John, "a spinnaker is a big triangle sail with the pointy end attached to the mast; and depending on the type of spinnaker, symmetric or asymmetric, attached to either a spinnaker pole or the bowsprit. The symmetric uses a spinnaker pole, while the asymmetric is attached to the bowsprit on one corner and a sheet on the other corner. This is so that you can use the sail on the port or starboard side depending on the wind. As far as ease of use, a dowsing sock can be used to deploy and recover a spinnaker. Haven't you ever seen the movie, Jackal, with Bruce Willis? He is sailing single handed on the Great Lakes, and by pushing a button at the helm, up comes the dowsing sock and the spinnaker deploys. Okay, St. John. I have to admit, they are pretty.

Miriam Raber wants to know how her boat air conditioning works. She says at her house she has the big thing making lots of noise outside. Yet, on the boat all she has to do is push a button. It's magic, Miriam. That button is attached to some mysterious unit somewhere deep in the seldom visited bowels of the bilge that somehow makes cold air and almost enough to cool your boat.
