#### Ask Cptn Dick

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From Dick Myers: Last month's article might have seemed to be a bit of a knock against sail boaters. While it is true that they normally cannot exceed hull speed -(1.34 X the square)root of the length of the water line) – there are other factors to consider: displacement, sail area, wind conditions, hull design, and friction of the water. At true hull speed, water displaced by the bow exactly fills the hole of the water left by the stern; therefore, no or minimal wake. A sailboat that is putting up a wake is exceeding hull speed. I can hear a few power boaters out there saying, "So what. My boat can go three to four times faster than a sailboat." Maybe so, but the sail boaters can sail right past the gas dock even if they never put up their sails. Here is a bit of interesting information taken from the magazine P.M.Y. A 60'-catamaran powerboat was tested equipped with twin 1015 mhp cat's. At 600 rpm, each engine was using 2 gallons per hour and the boat was moving at 6.9 knots, well within hull speed and average sailboat speed. The boat was getting 1.72 nmpg. At 2100 rpm total fuel usage was 89 gph and the speed was 34.7 kts, and the nmpg dropped to .39. So the question is, "What's in your wallet, or not." If you wish to do the math, on a 50 nautical mile trip, a sailboat will take 7.2 hours; you will take 1.44 hours. That is if you choose to burn 89 gallons per hour. At \$5 per gallon, you'll be spending \$103 per hour for the five hours you are sitting there waiting for the sailboat to come in.

Frank Craven wants to know what a bottle screw is. Most wine drinkers know that one; there is the time when you are on a boat trip and want a bottle of wine. But then you discover that you left the corkscrew ashore, then what to do. Look around for the proverbial loose screw somewhere on the boat. Screw the screw into the cork in the bottle, then either with a pair of plyers or wedging the head of the screw you can pull out the cork with your bottle screw.

Where the winds and whims lead you...

May is the time to make plans for cruising this summer. Everyone does it their own way, and there is no "right" way, but here are some of the things we consider when getting ready for a summer cruise.

- Be sure to get a good cruising guide and paper charts to decide on places you would like to visit.
- Check Eldridge or other sources for the currents and choose the best time to depart. Heading north on the Hudson, you can grab the current and have it with you all day. Going to LI sound is so much easier if you have a favorable current (4–4.5 kts) through Hell Gate and beyond. Heading South past the Verrazano Bridge is a lot easier if you don't have to fight the 2 kt current.
- Think about how many hours you like to be on the water, and how far that will get you. For us that is an average of about 40 nm/day on the water.
- Plan extra time so you can be flexible when deciding "weather" or not to go to the next destination.
- Do you like to stay at a destination for several days or move to new places frequently? The older we get the

more we enjoy staying a couple of days in one spot (and we now have the time).

- Do you like to spend lots of time ashore exploring and seeing the sights or do you like to kick back and relax on the hook, swim, read, fish, watch sunsets?
- What stops have easy access to re-provision, fuel and pump-out?
- Plan your daily navigation with waypoints that will get you into a new harbor if there is limited visibility. Write it down so the information is handy when you need it. We like to have the following information included:
  - Chart book page number(s)
  - Waypoint numbers
  - Latitude and Longitude for each
  - Nautical miles to the next waypoint
  - Buoy and/or marker numbers and any descriptions of the harbor that can be helpful
  - Cruising guide pages with marina phone numbers and information
- Modern electronics have made communication on the water easy. Most places have good cell phone service and many marinas have Wi-Fi. VHF radio is a "must", and a GPS/chart plotter makes navigation much easier. RADAR is *very* useful if the fog sets in.
- Leave a float plan with the club, and take an electrical meter reading before leaving. [Forms for both are available on the website <u>www.MinisceongoYC.org</u> under the Forms tab.]

If you have never gone cruising, try to overnight in Croton, Nyack or up the Hudson. Plan to go with a buddy boat, or join our cruise this summer to LI Sound the week of July 22.
