Ask Cptn. Dick

From Dick Myers: Well, as usual, Bonnie was right again. I guess I really should start listening to her more often. (Maybe next year ©.) A gunkhole is an out-of-the-way protected body of water. Some are navigable by boat, others only accessible by canoe or kayak. The term gunkhole is in reference to the bottom, usually muddy due to the slow movement of the water. Usually gunkholes are protected from the wind so they could be used as a hurricane hole with proper anchorage. Some boaters prefer a gunkhole over a marina for the quiet solitude they offer. MYC has a closeby gunk hole. Head south past Haverstraw, There is an opening on the west bank into a large protected cove in front of the electric plant. Word of caution: if you visit this gunkhole, get local knowledge as to the entrance way passage.

Normally, I take a question from someone and answer it in my inalienable way. This time I would like to relate to you an experience I had while participating in a Poker Run put on by the Vero Beach Power Squadron. On the last of five stops at different docks, I was pulling directly into a slip-type of dock when one of the dock hands grabbed my bow rail in an attempt to slow down my approach. In doing so, he pulled the bow toward the dock. Now granted, I was coming in a bit too fast and was about to go into reverse. But since he had a hold of my bow rail I didn't want to take a chance of pulling the poor old guy into the water. I consequently hit one of the dock pilings. Now my thought is that he should have thrown himself between my boat and the piling if he thought I might hit it instead of grabbing the bow rail. Fortunately, no damage was done. But I started thinking of our club and its nice new docks. So I thought I would give some advice on how to protect the docks from any boat damage. First, as I said

before, if a boat is in danger of hitting a piling, get in between the piling and the boat. You will find an arm or a leg works just as well. Now dock hands are not fully responsible for a safe landing. Crew members can also help out by grabbing pilings, using legs or arms to prevent a bump. My favorite is to jump off the boat to the dock before the boat stops. This will push the boat away from the dock preventing any damage. If you happen to fall in during this maneuver, you are in an excellent position to prevent damage to the docks

From Yard Chairman Roger Wieland: To my Fellow Members: The next time you're at the Club checking your boat, take a few minutes and check your neighbor's boat. Look around to be sure there isn't any debris or shrink wrap loose and blowing around. This can get into the beam path and cause the alarm to be set off.

If you plug into the electric be sure to unplug before you leave. This is a safety rule which we strictly adhere to.

Soon we'll be getting our boats ready for launching. Remember to secure your ladder when working on your boat and work safely. Also, you are responsible for disposing of your shrink wrap. *Do not put it in the Club dumpsters, take it home!*

The boats in the aisles should be ready for launching in April!
