John Kime's Introduction To Boating

I wonder how my grandfather felt as he watched the barge carrying the brownstone house he disassembled in lower Manhattan round the bend in the East River heading into Hell's Gate. Lots of friends of his thought his

heading into Hell's Gate. Lots of friends of his thought his attempt at moving a huge brownstone dwelling from Manhattan to College Point, one block from Flushing Bay, extremely ambitious. But, alone since the passing of his wife, raising a family of nine kids tested him to the fullest. Mom certainly knew how to raise a family in that old brownstone. She was the eldest of the nine children, and she assumed the responsibility of bringing up her brothers and sisters. I guess the experience made it comparatively easy, after she married, to rear her own smaller family, consisting of my brother Tony and me. Dad worked for the Lilly Tulip Cup Company as a tool and dye maker. He took us for rides in his 20' homemade plywood boat when we were not attending St. Fidelis School on College Point. St. Fidelis is sort of a family institution for us. Mom and Dad both attended it, as did my wife Marcia, and our two children, Julie and Danny.

Yacht Club Job

During the summers, from the time I was nine, I would earn money working at the Arrow Yacht Club at College Point. My chores consisted of rowing members to and from their moored boats because there were no docks for the boats. I guess

I'm the type who never leaves a good job, because I kept that one for 12 years. In the boat yard, I helped to launch and pull the boats on that club's greased timber system. In 1962 at the outbreak of the Vietnam War, I enlisted in the Navy, following my older

brother Tony's lead. The members of the Arrow Yacht Club threw a wonderful going away party, an event I will never forget. After bootcamp training at Great Lakes, I was assigned to the same ship as my brother — the shallow-draft destroyer, USS Blue, out of Long Beach, CA. Our first assignment was to head for Cuba for the Bay of Pigs Invasion. About half-way there, we suddenly received new orders and changed course to head for Vietnam and the Gulf of Tonkin. My job title was Engineman, my rank was E5 petty officer. With our shallow draft we were able to move in close to shore and give support to our land troops. In 1966 I returned

to Long Beach, CA and phoned my girlfriend, Marsha, to ask if she had any interest in marrying me. She accepted and moved out to the west coast, where we lived for a short time. After California and leaving the Navy, we moved back to College Point, and you guessed it, into the

brownstone.

Starting my electronics business was tough to say the least but equipped with the education I received with the on-the-job training in the Navy, I had the determination and the confidence.

In 1980, we moved to Rivervale, NJ. It was about that time that I purchased a 25' Sea Ray and kept it in Haverstraw. One day I met Fred Topinka, and he introduced me to Minisceongo. As soon as I saw MYC, my memories of the Arrow Yacht Club and the meticulous way it was kept crept back into my mind. Although MYC is much larger,

the same family style friendliness abounds, just as I remembered it as a kid at the Arrow Club. I really feel like I've found my way home.


