Each of the next three weekends along with Wednesday hauls will be very busy lifting, washing, and blocking boats. The storage yard will fill up quickly as every spot along with some aisles must be used. Over at the finger 1 parking lot, Penny Bridge Marine is starting to fill the area with their boats

in connection with our new winter lease agreement. By the time we finish our hauling activities, the lot will be pretty full of blocked boats but will have a wide service aisle for our

members to drive through for access to finger 6 during the winter months.

On our non-work day-work day, some needed projects got started over at the Maintenance shop (Jerry's). Joe Carpenter and his crew worked on a variety of jobs. They started installing sheet rock on the ceiling of the garage to better insulate the area. Associate Shaun Foran led the project by applying his personal construction skills to measuring, cutting-to-fit and installing the sheet rock on the ceiling. This is tedious and physical work (thank God he's young), but by the end of the day it looked great. The project should be finished before the winter months kick in. The new storage carbov (thanks to Rear Commodore Rich Brienza) was

also installed in the oil storage area. This will greatly help with handling waste oil and improve our safety while storing it. Remember that all oil and antifreeze waste must be left outside the door unless someone from maintenance is present. Any containers that you may want back should be marked and will be put outside the door after being emptied.

New Regular member Robert (Yogi)

Scheffold assisted with various repairs around the shop and grounds and New Regular Frank Brown worked on the ceiling installation. Frank Covino gave his support by putting together some

last minute electrical fixes that were needed at Jerry's so that the ceiling installation wouldn't be held up. All around a very productive day.

Other Committees were also going about with harbor work, some boat hauling activities, electrical work, etc. But when lunch time came around, Bill and his crew came up with nonwork day-work day lunch. What's better than that, you cancel the work day, members show up to work anyway and get fed.

The search for a new Travel Lift is progressing well and the status of this and the New Clubhouse project will be presented at our next meeting. Our next big event is the "Change of Watch" dinner. Get your reservations in.

To Albany by Sailboat: A Combination of Astronomy and Nostalgia

September 2017 - by Curt Koster

The end of Summer 2017 was approaching and we still had not found the right window in our schedules to take an annual cruise. In early retirement we had cruised *Carpathia*, a Sabre-34 sloop with a six-ft draft and 51-

ft mast-height from Virginia, along the coasts of New England and through the Reversing Falls on the St John River to Fredericton, Canada. These days find us on the same comfortable and pretty boat but also the reality of a more limited cruising range. With our home ports of The Nyack Boat Club and The Minisceongo Yacht Club the 100-mile stretch on the Hudson River to the Troy Lock offers views rivaling the Rhine, in sheltered waters and Amtrack to move crew around for the entire distance.

Some 38 years ago, on our September honeymoon we did the scene from 'High Society' (Bing Crosby and Grace Kelly) on a beautiful Chesapeake-32 generously lent to us by my brother, Preston. That trip, starting at Nyack included Cold Spring, Catskill and Albany/Rensselaer where my [great] Uncle Tommy picked us up to visit his dairy farm in nearby East Skodack, NY.

To be realistic, cruising a sailboat on The Hudson is largely a motor trip. Since Carpathia can 'go forever' at 5-1/2 knots through the water and currents go both north and south at up to 2 kts, for the same effort we could go between 3.5 and 7.5 kts. That's over a 2:1 ratio and well worth the planning it takes to get a boost from favorable tides. Another constraint is our preference to get an early start so that we reach the next port by early afternoon. A final concern is to also have the benefit of favorable ebb tides on the return trip. I would be embarrassed to admit how many hours that I have spent pondering current tables for stations up and down the River. Gradually it became evident there was only one 'perfect window' each month. Finally getting down to fundamental causes, I realized that, with regard to cruising the Hudson, the Ancient Hebrews had it right: it's a Moon thing. Specifically, a 7 to 10 day round trip from Nyack to Albany should begin at, or one day before the NEW MOON.

- 1. The Board discussed how to fund the travel lift 8. Vice Commodo scheduled to be purchased next year. Alternatives will be evaluated and presented to the members. 9. Vice Commodo 9.
- 2. Director Tamagny discussed the pins awarded for years of service. He feels there is no designated person or committee now responsible for these awards. He

feels it should be the Membership Committee.

- 3. Director Tamagny addressed the regular members who have an assigned slip but no boat. This situation appears to be addressed within our bylaws.
- 4. Director Tamagny expressed concern that we purchase new straps for the travel lift but they have not yet been used. He was advised that they will be used starting immediately.
- 5. The responsibility for our insurance policies was discussed and the responsibilities will be changed for the 2018 year to be brought more in line with reality.
- 6. Director Silver advised that the Bylaw Committee rewrote the intended bylaw change to be more understandable and address some of the members concerns.
- 7. Director Senackerib advised that a number of electric meter boards and counters will be changed to improve the service.

- 8. Vice Commodore Brienza advised that the work day has been cancelled.
- 9. Vice Commodore Brienza advised that two associates would like to store their boats in water for the coming winter season. This needs to be discussed with the Harbor, Ice and Electric Committees.



This year we over-nighted at The Chelsea Yacht Club, Kingston/Roundout, Shady Harbor in New Baltimore followed by a short run against the current to reach the hospitable, comfortable and very well situated Albany Yacht Club. My favorite sight this trip was the steel fab yard for the new Tappan Zee Bridge at Coeymans, just above New Baltimore. Big blue steel sections sat on steel arms parallel to and overhanging the riverbank. Beneath the sections were partially submerged barges which, when pumped out would lift the bridge sections off the arms, ready for their trip down to South Nyack and Tarrytown. The technology appears to be the same as that used to move the stones to The Pyramids only this time they have diesel pumps instead of buckets carried by the same guys with the Lunar Calendar.



For our purposes, the best feature of the Albany Yacht Club was the 15-minute walk to a 'new' Amtrack station which has an Enterprise car rental agency. With a fine set of wheels we got to explore Albany, attend the tugboat round-up next to the lock in Waterford and Saratoga Springs. For nostalgia sake, I could not resist the short drive to East Skodack. Thirty-eight years later, the small grocery store is closed and both Uncle Tommy and the Post Office are long gone. But the rest of the village is in a time capsule. Three-quarters of it are the same houses, nicely maintained, but one quarter of the village is Uncle Tommy's dairy farm: vacant and fallow. The main house, built in the Federal Style and his once beautiful barn are standing but unoccupied and beginning to come apart.



On a happier note, an advantage of keeping a schedule we enjoyed an evening in Roundout with the Schweiker's, Fass's heading south and Ed Luce, son of Jim Luce with whom I have worked, travelled the world and sailed for 40 yrs. Ed is a mate on the Canadian tall ship *St. Lawrence II* headed home for the winter. Thanks to cell phones little ships don't just pass in the night: they stop for dinner.

If I may include in a final note of nostalgia, this summer was really my third trip by boat to Albany. During WWII, with gasoline strictly rationed my mother, for the sake of domestic tranquility would take her mother and me to the Dayliner piers on the West Side where we would board the night steamer to Albany. Next morning would find us docked at Albany and, you guessed it, Uncle Tommy would pick us up and take us to his (then) very prosperous farm. In those days the trip back to The City was also by steam with me getting strict lessons in table manners from Grammy in the elegant dining car of the New York Central.


























More Happenings Around MYC
