Cruising Fleet News

From Chairman Dick Myers: As we start another year, I would like to wish all of you a healthy and happy 2010 with many more to follow. May you get to cruise where you want to and enjoy the camaraderie of your friends around you.

This is the start of my 97th article I've written for the Cruising Fleet, almost enough "Ask Captain Dick" articles to fill a bathroom break pamphlet. I must say I've enjoyed being your Cruising Fleet Director these past eight years and looking forward to one more.

Ask Captain Dick: Carbon monoxide, a deadly colorless, odorless, tasteless gas formed by the incomplete burning of carbon containing compounds. Carbon monoxide can also be made by the dehydration of formic acid such as sulfuric acid. That's why a carbon monoxide detector will also alarm when boat batteries are being over charged. The most popular type of CO₂ detector is an electrochemical sensor that produces a current related to the amount of CO₂ present in the atmosphere. The lifetime of this type of unit is five or more years.

A **fume detector** only senses unburned molecules in vapor form produced by the evaporation of leaking fuel or hydrogen from charging batteries. The fume detector is usually set to detect fumes at 20 percent of lel (lower explosive limit) of the type of fuel vapors it is most likely to encounter. A fume detector will not detect carbon monoxide and vice versa.

Gurran Kane wants to know the proper tongue weight for his trailered boat. Personally I try to keep my tongue in my mouth when I trailer my boat, although, there have been times...!
