- ➤ Be sure your cover is secure and not blowing into the security beam path.
- ➤ Be a good neighbor and check the boats next to you.

Minisceongo Yacht Club

STONY POINT, NEW YORK

he Hudson River offers cruisers many charms: spectacular mountain scenery, easy navigation and plenty of places to stop for the night, out of the offen swift tidal current and wakes kicked up by tow boats and freighters. In addition to the commercial marinas along the shores of nearly every town on the waterway, the yacht clubs merit visits.



When I cruise the Hudson River, I make sure to stop at the Minisceongo Yacht Club (MYC) at Stony Point. I enjoy the bucolic atmosphere and the family oriented spirit of this beautifully maintained club, located about 45 miles upriver from Sandy Hook Bay. I'm not alone. Minisceongo ranks as tops among transients who think of it as their yacht club away from home.

The club's protected yacht basin represents its greatest practical appeal. Sturdy stone bulkheads keep out the ubiquitous river chop, assuring a good night's rest. The tall flag pole on the club's grounds serves as a fine landmark. Pick up the channel markers south of the narrow entrance into the basin, and resist the urge to head straight in or you could find yourself aground. Once through the entrance channel, the gas dock lies to starboard, where the dockmaster will direct you to a slip. On a busy summer weekend, call ahead to ensure space is available.

MYC's lawns are always neat, its flower beds always well-tended. The club recently upgraded its showers and heads. They keep them in spotless condition, and you'll find a level of privacy seldom seen at even the priciest marinas.

The Snack Shack, where you can buy simple, delicious meals, or hang around and talk with other boaters, affords a fine view of the broad expanse

> of Haverstraw Bay. There are also a few barbecues and picnic tables.

The club has 126 slips, 10 of which are for transients, all with electric hook-ups. Dockage fees run \$1 per foot. If you don't need electricity, a couple of berths are available for smaller craft for \$10 a night

— one of the best dockage bargains on the river. A deli and convenience store, where you can buy beer and supplies, and some other shops, are within walking distance of MYC.

Minisceongo — it took me some doing to finally get it right (it's pronounced MINN-eh-see-on-go). The club's moniker is taken from a creek which runs along its northwest border. Credit for the tongue twister goes to the Tappan Indians. Another version of the name — Minniscongo, meaning "almost an island" — refers to Grassy Point, which comprises much of the club's present grounds.

Minisceongo Yacht Club was founded in 1941. Ancestors of the original members were Irish immigrants who settled in Rockland County during the 1800s to work in the scores of brick yards then thriving along the shores of Haverstraw Bay. The brick industry on the Hudson River burgeoned following improve-

ments in brick manufacturing methods after 1815. The market for bricks increased as New York City grew, and many deep clay beds were dug. Irishmen digging for clay hollowed out what later became MYC's harbor. It's fitting that MYC's founders chose kelly green, with a white M, for their club's burgee colors.

You won't find pomp and pretense and stewards decked out in blue blazers at this club. They don't fire a cannon when they raise or lower the flag, either. At MYC, you'll be greeted and treated like a friend, even if you're a complete stranger visiting for the first time. And, believe me, you'll want to come back again and again to enjoy this special place.
