From Yard Chairman Roger Wieland: The Haul-out Schedule will be posted in the Clubhouse and the Snack Shack on October 1, 2012. If you have not sent in your form or contacted me and want to store at MYC, call me on my cell: [see hard copy for number].

Prior to being hauled, locate your stands and lubricate them; and be sure your name is on them. If you haven't noticed, all the stands look alike.

On all weekend haul-out days, we start at 0800. Please sign in on the chalkboard located on the Yard Container door. We will haul boats according to the list unless the tide dictates otherwise, i.e. boats with a draft >4.5 ft.

If you are unstepping your mast, contact me for instructions and bring additional help with you when we haul your boat.

This year we are starting to implement a change to the Yard layout. The first three rows are reserved for larger boats, i.e. >40 ft. Rows 4, 5 and 6 will be for all other boats. There will still be boats located in the aisles. The aisle boats will be the first launched in the spring.

#### **Nearby Cruising Destinations**

If you have a beautiful crisp sunny day and want to take a final fall outing, there are several places nearby that offer dock and dine opportunities. Many club members are familiar with Torches on the Hudson in Newburg 845-568-0100, where you can dock for free if you dine. The approach is deep, and there is a swift current. Pass the large green roofed restaurant and pull alongside the long facing dock.

If your travels take you south, you can visit Tarrytown, just north of the Tappan Zee Bridge. There are two options here. To the north is the Tarrytown Marina. They have a free floating dock in front of the *Striped Bass Restaurant* 914-366-4455. There is outdoor seating with a very nice selection of seafood dishes, raw bar, pasta and sandwiches at reasonable prices. When approaching the marina, follow the markers carefully especially when the water is low. The marked channel runs diagonal (southeast) in toward shore, and parallel to the bulkhead until you come to the entrance of the marina. Continue straight to the long floating dock that is next to the restaurant patio.

Just to the south is a small marina that houses the Washington Irving Boat Club and the Sunset Cove Restaurant 914-366-7889. This is a lovely spot with an upscale menu, a wide variety of trendy dishes and a beautiful deck looking out over the Hudson River and the TZ Bridge. To approach the Washington Irvington Boat Club, go south to the Bridge, and follow the local markers northeast into the small marina and ask to tie

up on the facing dock on the left. There is not much space to turn, so it is only for boats under 30 feet.

Or simply get out on the river for a spin and come back to have a friendly BBQ at MYC. Enjoy these last boating days of the season!

# Ask Cptn. Dick

From Dick Myers: And just when you thought it would be safe to read Ship to Shore again, here I am back by popular request. Actually, I had almost three people ask me to continue writing my article.

I would like to say thank you to the Cruising Fleet for the nice send off. I was going to write individual thank you notes to everyone, but when you consider that everyone in the club plus their partners can be considered members of the Cruising Fleet, that amounts to over 300 stamps. Again, thank you, the one third of my life I spent at MYC and the wonderful people I met will always bring back beautiful memories.

A retired member of MYC, Bob Novas explained what a Genoa is. A sloop has a mainsail and a jib. The jib fills the forward triangle formed by the mast, deck and forward stay. A Genoa, also known as a jenny, is used instead of a jib and extends beyond the mast. Its size is expressed as a percentage of the forward triangle. At 110%, the smallest of the jenny is called a lapper. At 135% it is a Genoa 2, 150%, Genoa 3, then comes the drifter at 160 to 165%

The name Genoa comes from a 6-meter boat racing in a regatta back in 1927. The crew aboard *Genoa* won the race by sewing extra sail material onto their jib. At that time there were no rules against the larger jib.

While researching Genoa, the name Spinnaker kept popping up. Everyone knows that the Spinnaker is a hotel in Ocean City, Maryland, and also a resort vacation provider. I guess they are trying to get some sailors who are tired of playing with their Genoa to go out and have some real fun.
