From Dick Myers: Sometimes an answer leads to more questions, such as the term Northern Vernal Equinox. While this is the true term for the first point of Aries, you have to be familiar with the earth's trip around the sun and the tilt of the earth as it revolves about the sun. Because of this tilt of about 23°, as the earth travels around the sun on its yearly trip, the sun appears to travel in its daily crossing from east to west a little bit more to the north until about June 21. This is known as the **summer solstice**. At this point the sun will appear to start heading south, and will continue on its yearly journey south until it reaches its maximum southerly trip about December 22, or winter solstice. At some point on the sun's apparent trip from north to south and south to north we have a halfway point known as the equinox. So now you have the vernal and the autumnal equinox. Someone in the northern hemisphere decided to call the vernal equinox the Northern Vernal Equinox and named it the first point of Aries for celestial navigation. Here's a little tidbit for you. Aries was originally the constellation behind the sun when all the constellations were

The Cruising Destination of the Month is Milford, CT

We are hoping we can get many boats out to LI Sound this summer, and we have found Milford to always be a nice stopping spot along the Connecticut shore. There are several overnight options including anchoring off Charles Island in the Gulf, MYC (Milford Yacht Club) with a pool and restaurant and great views, but a mile walk to town, and our favorite, the Milford Landing, the town dock all the way up the creek in the center of town. The harbor is very crowded with sections of moored docks that keep the boats from swinging so they can pack the harbor full, and maintain a clear channel. Milford Landing is run by the town and is only for transients. As far as I know, there are no moorings for transients. On the weekends you will need a reservation. There are several shops and restaurants close by, and they have clean facilities and picnic area. There is even an ice cream shop on the premises, and a ship store in the next marina.

Our first visit happened to be when there was a large farmer's market on the town green with all kinds of food, arts, crafts and entertainment. Later that night we ate outside and danced to a live band covering old time rock and roll favorites. On another trip, cruising with the Kahn's (Oscar), we had just settled in when the dock hands came down to warn us that there was a tornado watch. They helped us add extra lines, and we then anxiously watched the storm approach on our radar. Thankfully it passed to the north, followed by a beautiful sunset instead. If you like exploring, there are a number of mapped walking trail loops. John and Barbara O'Blenis (State Of Mind) invited us to join them to explore on foot. We crossed the creek and strolled through a lovely shady park and residential neighborhood until we came to the beach with a snack bar and bath house. It was a lovely walk with great views of the Gulf, Gulf Pond and Milford Harbor. Some people like to kayak upstream past the bridge to the waterfalls to fish in the shade of the overhanging trees. This is indeed a lovely spot with lots to see and do.
